dialogue

is a conversation (speech/talking) between two or more characters

Text

Across the year groups children will write in different ways which will use the following knowledge:

describe

to say or write what something is like

information

facts about a person, place, event etc

instruction

lists of items and numbered points detailing how to carry out a certain activity

argue

express a points of view 'for' or 'against'

explanation (explain)

describes a how and why something is done

playscript

a piece of writing written for actors to read from

poetry

a piece of writing that uses imagination and words to share ideas, feelings or a story

fiction

a piece of writing which describes people and events which are not true facts

non-fiction

a text that is not a story and gives true facts and information

setting

the place in a story takes place

character

a person (or animal) in a story
